- An East Coast Credit Union meeting is being seen as a positive step toward preventing branch closures. Richmond County Councillor Malcolm Beaton, who represents areas from D'Escousse to Rocky Bay, said an afternoon session in Port Hawkesbury on Sunday, Feb. 21 allowed both the company and its members to express concerns over the economic challenges facing three of the company's 13 branches. Citing financial concerns, the banking cooperative announced in November it would close branches in North East Margaree in Margaree Centre, North Isle Madame in D'Escousse, and Mulgrave. The closures and the loss of seven full-time jobs was expected to take place at the end of February, however, the credit union's board of directors delayed the decision following a public outcry from members and community representatives. The board has decided to put together a working committee of financial experts, credit union board members and customers. A study on the operation of East Coast Credit Union is expected to take place over the next 12-18 months.
- The Province of Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Co-operative Council will take part in a special announcement via live Webcast today, February 24, 2010. Premier Darrell Dexter, Community Services Minister Denise Peterson-Rafuse, and NS Cooperative Council CEO Dianne Kelderman will launch **Target 100**, a new employment program.   - The broadcast will begin at 10a.m. from a downtown Halifax co-op location.
- The Coastal Financial Credit Union in Yarmouth is showing its support for Canadian Olympic athletes by making cash donations to the Yarmouth Food Bank every time Team Canada takes home a medal. Sonia Ryan, director of human resources, said the credit union will make the cash donation to the food bank, regardless of what colour the medal is. "We're donating \$100 for gold, \$75 for silver and \$50 for bronze." Ryan said the idea for the credit union's Olympic Fever, came about during a managers' meeting. "We were all brain storming on ideas of how to help our community, when the general manager threw out the idea of Olympic Fever. From there we have all worked with it and have come up with what we have now." She said, as part of the co-operative movement, the credit union is guided under the co-operative principles one of which is serving the community. "That is more or less the spirit of where the discussion came from to enrich our community and what we can do, and we thought this would be a great idea to support the local community." This promotion will last throughout the Olympic Games.

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - The hotness of curry powder varies dramatically depending on the blend of up to 20 different spices that can be used. Most commercially available curry powder is quite mild. If you would like a little more heat with your seafood, look for curry powder labeled "hot" or "Madras-style."

## Curried Seafood with Linguine

4 oz medium shrimp, peeled

4 oz sea scallops (halve large scallops)

6 oz dried linguine

1/3 cup apricot nectar

1 tbsp soy sauce

1 tsp cornstarch

½ tsp ground ginger

2 tbsp olive oil, divided

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

½ cup thinly sliced carrots

3 cups coarsely chopped bok choy

2 green onions, sliced into 1-inch pieces

1 ½ to 2 tsp curry powder

Rinse shrimp and scallops; pat dry with paper towels; set aside. Cook pasta according to package directions; drain. Cover and keep warm. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, stir together apricot nectar, soy sauce, cornstarch, and ginger; set aside. In a large skillet or wok, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms and carrots; stir-fry for 2 minutes. Add bok choy and green onions; stir-fry for 2 minutes more. Remove vegetables with a slotted spoon. In a medium bowl, toss shrimp and scallops with curry powder. Add the remaining 1 tablespoon oil and the seafood to skillet. Cook and stir for 2 to 3 minutes or until seafood is opaque; push from center of skillet. Stir apricot nectar mixture; add to center of skillet. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Return vegetables to skillet. Stir all ingredients together to coat with sauce; heat through. To serve, spoon seafood mixture over hot cooked pasta. – *Glenna Weagle*

The entire co-operative is made up of more than 1,000 grower-members who own more than 50,000 acres of citrus groves in the heart of central Florida. 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<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Here is a quick and easy chicken dish which can be featured with a salad for lunch or added to a plate of cooked veggies for dinner. Skinless, boneless chicken breast can be substituted for the tenderloins.

#### Basil-Tomato Chicken Skillet

1 lb chicken breast tenderloins

1 tbsp cooking oil

1/8 tsp salt

1/8 tsp ground black pepper

1 14-oz can diced tomatoes, drained

1/4 cup snipped fresh basil

1 package pre-washed spinach

2 tbsp finely shredded Parmesan cheese

Cut any large chicken tenderloins in half lengthwise. Over medium-high heat, add oil to 12-inch skillet. Cook and stir chicken in hot skillet about 5 minutes or until done. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add tomatoes and basil; heat through. Remove from heat. Add spinach; toss until wilted. Divide among 4 plates. Sprinkle with cheese. – *Glenna Weagle*

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<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - We often hear pork being described as "the other white meat" and it is being promoted quite well these days. Lamb on the other hand seems not to be so well promoted. It is one of the healthier meats and I try to include it in my meal plans. Here's a recipe for lamb chops that has great flavour and also looks too good to be healthy.

## Spice Rubbed Lamb Chops

1 tsp. finely shredded orange peel

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp. ground cumin

1/8 tsp. salt

8 lamb rib chops, cut 1 inch thick, frenched if desired

2 tsp. olive oil

1 medium carrot, halved lengthwise and sliced

1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 cup water

1 can diced tomatoes

3/4 cup canned chickpeas (garbanzo beans), rinsed and drained

1/2 cup whole-wheat couscous

1/4 cup snipped fresh Italian (flat-leaf) parsley

Orange wedges

In a bowl combine orange peel, cinnamon, cumin, and salt. Trim fat from lamb chops. Rub orange peel mixture over both sides of chops. In 12-inch nonstick skillet, heat oil over mediumhigh heat. Add lamb chops. Reduce heat to medium. Cook for 9 to 11 minutes for medium doneness, turning halfway through. Remove from skillet. Keep warm. Add carrots and onion to skillet; cook and stir 3 minute. Slowly add water, add un-drained tomatoes, and chickpeas. Bring to boiling; stir in couscous. Top with chops. Remove from heat. Let stand 5 minutes. Transfer lamb chops to platter. Fluff couscous with fork, place in serving dish; sprinkle with parsley. Serve garnished with orange wedges. – *Glenna Weagle*

## Adobo Pork Chops

6 boneless pork loin chops, cut ¾ inch thick

3 tbsp packed brown sugar

2 tbsp olive oil

2 tbsp orange juice

2 tbsp snipped fresh cilantro

1 tbsp red wine or cider vinegar

2 tsp hot chili powder

1 tsp ground cumin

1 tsp dried oregano, crushed

½ tsp salt

½ tsp ground red pepper (optional)

1/4 tsp ground cinnamon

2 cloves garlic, minced

Trim fat from chops. Place chops in a plastic bag set in a shallow dish. For marinade, in a small bowl combine brown sugar, oil, orange juice, cilantro, vinegar, chili powder, cumin, oregano, salt, red pepper (if desired), cinnamon, and garlic. Pour over chops; seal bag. Marinate in the refrigerator for 2 to 24 hours, turning occasionally.

Drain chops, discarding marinade. Grill chops for 12 to 15 minutes or until chops are done, turning once halfway through grilling. – *Glenna Weagle*

- The first year of a new three-year contract awarded to New Brunswick Power of Fredericton, NB, will lower the cost of electricity supply for Eastern Maine Electric Co-operative members from the existing rate of 9.15 cents per kilowatt-hour to 7.354 cents per kilowatthour. The decrease will bring a savings of 1.796 cents per kilowatt-hour on electricity used beginning April 1. Eastern Maine Electric Cooperative is a not-for-profit, consumer-owned utility serving approximately 12,600 members in a 3,000-square-mile area in Penobscot, Aroostook and northern Washington counties. According to the cooperative's Charlie McAlpine, the move drops the supply rate at the cooperative below the company's closest competitor, Bangor Hydro Electric Co. The new rate will decrease the total residential electric bill by approximately 10 percent and the standard offer supply portion of the bill by 19 percent. After the deregulation of Maine's electricity market, utilities such as Eastern Maine Electric provided delivery service for the electricity sold to its customers by another company. The delivery utilities are responsible for the power lines and perform the metering and billing for both delivery service and electricity supply. The electricity supply billing is forwarded to the standard offer supplier. http://www.bangordailynews.com/detail/136125.html

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - There is a saying to the effect that "everything old is new again". That sometimes happens in my kitchen when the cooks are looking for a change of pace. This week the old that became new was Impossible Pie, a recipe I used to prepare quite often which had been shuffled out of the mix. It is a great tasting dessert which magically separates into a crust, custard centre and browned coconut top while baking. If you want a more impressive dessert simply garnish with whipped cream and some fresh fruit.

## Impossible Pie

1 cup shredded coconut

1/2 cup flour

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup butter, softened

1/4 tsp baking powder

4 eggs, beaten

2 tsp vanilla extract

2 cups milk

Combine all ingredients, mixing until smooth. Pour into a buttered 9-inch pie plate. Bake at 350F for about 1 hour (a toothpick inserted near middle should come out clean).

This pie also comes in a Pumpkin version.

1 tin evaporated milk

2 eggs

3/4 cup sugar

16 oz tin or 2 cups pumpkin

1/2 cup biscuit mix

2 1/2 tsp pumpkin pie spice

2 tbsp butter

2 tsp vanilla extract

Blend all ingredients until smooth. Pour into lightly buttered 9-inch pie plate. Bake at 325F for 50 to 55 minutes (a toothpick inserted near centre should come out clean). – *Glenna Weagle*

The elegance of the 10 percent shift right now is that it doesn't ask people to expand their budgets and spend more. It asks people to be more conscious about where they spend what they've already budgeted for." I will be watching this program with interest. <u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Stir fry is one of my favourite ways to cook. It is quick and easy and clean-up is usually a breeze. Many vegetables can be prepared ahead of time and held until you are ready to cook them. If you want the dish to go a bit further, try throwing in a couple of handfuls of baby spinach at the end, allowing just enough time for it to wilt down. In this recipe the apples pair nicely with the pork.

Pork Apple Stir Fry
Cooked rice or noodles
1 tbsp. soy sauce
1 tbsp. brown sugar

1 tsp. ground ginger

Pinch crushed chilies (optional)

1/2 tsp. cornstarch

2 tsp. vegetable oil

3/4 lb. lean pork (leg or loin) cut into 2x1/2 inch strips

1 cup apple cider/juice

1 medium red onion, it in wedges

1 stalk celery, sliced

1 cup cabbage, thinly sliced

2 cups sliced green vegetables (peppers, peas, green beans, etc)

3 red cooking apples, cored and cut in wedges

Combine soy sauce, brown sugar, ginger, chilies and cornstarch; stir well and set aside. Heat oil in large, heavy skillet or wok over high heat; brown pork strips 1 to 2 minutes. Add onions and celery; cook while stirring about 1 to 2 minutes. Add cabbage and green vegetables; cook and stir 2 minutes. Stir apples and soy sauce mixture into vegetables. Bring to a boil; reduce heat to medium. Cook 2 to 3 minutes until sauce thickens. DO NOT OVERCOOK. Serve immediately over rice or noodles. – *Glenna Weagle*

The Canadian Co-operative Association needs credit unions from across Canada to host overseas credit union managers arriving this June. Fourteen women from credit unions in the developing world will spend ten days (June 9 19) within a credit union receiving general leadership training and learning the ins-and-outs of managing a loans program. - Co-operatives around the world will focus on **women** when they celebrate the **International Day of Co-operatives on July 3, 2010**. The International Co-operative Alliance (ICA) has announced that this year's International Day theme will be "Co-operative enterprise empowers women" and will highlight the role co-ops play in responding to women's needs. ICA has celebrated the first Saturday in July as International Co-operatives Day since 1923. In 1995, the same day was proclaimed by the United Nations as a way of increasing international awareness of co-operatives. In Canada, the themes of Co-op Week and International Credit Union Day will be announced later this spring. Co-op Week will take place on October 17-23rd, 2010, with International Credit Union Day on Oct. 21.
- Canada's two national co-op associations have **created a new information service** aimed at providing a first point of contact for groups who are interested in starting a co-op. The Co-op Development InfoService, which was launched on March 31 by the **Canadian Co-operative Association (CCA) and the Conseil candien de la coopération et de la mutualité**, includes a toll-free telephone number, a dedicated e-mail address and co-op development information on the CCA and CCCM websites. The InfoService is funded by the federal government through the Advisory Services component of the Co-operative Development Initiative (CDI). The object of the service is to make it easier for people to obtain co-op development information and assistance, regardless of where they live in Canada. Provincial co-op associations will continue to be responsible for "on-the-ground" co-op development, and in many cases, users of the InfoService will be referred to the appropriate provincial association. In order to get a fair price for Island fishermen, the catch needs to be held until the height of tourist season, he said.
- Groups in Nova Scotia recently receiving funding under the Government of Canada's Cooperative Development Initiative (CDI) are listed below. The projects are funded under the CDI, a four-year, \$19.1-million program that helps Canadians develop new co-operatives and experiment with innovative ways of using the co-operative model. This initiative has been successful in making the co-operative option readily available to Canadians by improving access to advisory services, helping co-operatives raise the funds they need to succeed, and advancing research and knowledge development. The CDI is managed by the Canadian Co-operative Association and the Conseil canadien de la coopération et de la mutualité in partnership with the Government of Canada. **Clean Annapolis River Project**, Annapolis Royal, NS, \$15,000 Description: The proponents will explore the feasibility of creating an Atlantic Ecosystem Co-operative that will market the specialized environmental protection expertise that its members have developed over the years. The proponents of this co-operative are 18 non-profit environmental management organizations. The co-operative will generate new funds to reinvest in charities and environmental activities.

**Grainery Food Co-op**, Halifax, NS, \$12,700 Description: The goal of this co-operative is to offer locally grown, organic produce. This project aims to modernize the co-operative by stabilizing and documenting its operations and by developing a new business plan that will include relocation to the new Halifax Seaport Farmers' Market.

Scotia Direct Lobster Co-op Ltd., Saulnierville, NS, \$20,000 Description: The goal of this project is to use a new transportation method to revitalize the fresh lobster market for Nova Scotia fishers. Aqualife technology is now used in complement of airplanes for the transportation of live shellfish. The ability to export live lobster, freshly caught from the ocean, will greatly increase the value of the catch, thereby increasing profits for fishers.

Annapolis Oilseed Co-op, Lawrencetown, NS, \$15,000, Annapolis County has a wealth of agricultural lands, but many of them are lying fallow. The goal of this project is to study the viability of an oilseed processing plant that would primarily produce soybean meal, with biodiesel as its main by-product. The plant would operate using a closed loop system.

Le Conseil coopépartif acadien de la Nouvelle-Écosse for the Public transit co-operative project committee, Chéticamp, NS, \$20,000 Description: This co-operative will offer a public transit service for persons with mobility issues in the Chéticamp region. The main

users will be elderly persons, but some residents without vehicles are also expected to use the service. This project will address a need identified by the residents of the municipality, which does not even have a taxi service.

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - This succulent salmon dish, which requires only 15 minutes of roasting time, is dressed for spring in a fresh tasting vinaigrette made while the fish is cooking.

## Salmon with Lemon-Tarragon Vinaigrette

1 bunch of green onions

3 to 4-lb side of salmon

pinch of salt

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 tsp Dijon mustard

1/3 cup olive oil

1 tbsp finely chopped fresh tarragon

1 tbsp capers

2 lemons

bok choy or fennel (optional)

Trim and discard ends from onions, then slice in half crosswise. Line a baking sheet with foil, (do not oil). Place salmon on foil and scatter onions around it. Sprinkle all with salt. Roast in centre of oven at 450F for 15 minutes, or until a knife tip inserted in centre of salmon and held there for 5 seconds comes out warm. Meanwhile, squeeze juice from lemons into a medium bowl. Whisk in garlic and Dijon. Slowly whisk in oil. Stir in tarragon and capers. Remove the cooked salmon to a serving platter that has sides deep enough to hold the vinaigrette. (To serve fish without skin on, slip two wide spatulas between skin and salmon, then carefully lift, leaving skin on foil.) Scatter onions around fish. Drizzle with half of the vinaigrette and serve the remainder alongside the meal. Serve with steamed bok choy or braised fennel if desired. – *Glenna Weagle*

**Co-op Cooking** - This Asian-influenced pork tenderloin gets its extraordinary flavor from a zesty ginger brush-on and a tangy mustard sour cream sauce.

#### Sesame Pork Roast with Mustard Cream

1/4 cup bottled chili sauce

2 tbsp teriyaki sauce

2 tsp grated fresh ginger or ¼ tsp ground ginger

2 cloves garlic, minced

2 (12 to 16-oz) tenderloins

2 tsp sesame seeds

1/4 cup dairy sour cream

1 green onion, finely chopped

1 tsp Dijon mustard

dash salt

sliced green onion tops (optional)

3 cups fresh baby spinach

For basting sauce, in a small bowl, stir together chili sauce, teriyaki sauce, ginger, and garlic. Place pork tenderloins on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Brush some of the basting sauce over tenderloins. Roast at 425F for 15 minutes. Brush tenderloins with additional basting sauce. (Discard any remaining sauce). Sprinkle tenderloins with sesame seeds. Roast for 10 to 20

minutes more or until an instant-read thermometer inserted in the thickest part of each tenderloin registers 160F.

Meanwhile, for mustard sauce, in a small bowl, stir together sour cream, the finely chopped green onion, mustard, and salt. If desired, sprinkle with green onion tops.

To serve, place spinach on a serving platter. Slice 1 of the tenderloins (cover and chill remaining tenderloin for another meal); arrange sliced tenderloin on top of the spinach. Serve with all of the mustard sauce. Make-Ahead Hint: Basting sauce and mustard sauce can be prepared and chilled up to 24 hours. – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - I think my love of cookbooks was passed along by my mother who used to bring them home from the library and read them like novels. (She also taught me a recipe is only a starting place). Over the years I have collected quite a few cookbooks. My oldest one is "Dr Chases New Receipt Book" published in 1889 and my newest was picked up last Saturday at our local feed store. The ones that I tend to enjoy the most are those published by local churches, schools, clubs, etc. The recipes are tried and true and usually somebody's favorite. Here is one from a local horse association.

#### Creamy Chicken and Rice Bake

1 can cream soup (chicken or mushroom)

1/2 can water

3/4 cup uncooked long grain white rice

1/2 tsp onion powder

1/3 tsp ground black pepper

2 cups fresh cut-up vegetables (or frozen)

4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Mix soup, water, rice, onion powder and pepper in 2-quart baking dish. Stir in vegetables, (if frozen, thaw under running water). Top with chicken and sprinkle with additional pepper if desired. Cover and bake at 375F until chicken is cooked through and rice is tender (approx. 1 hour). Remove chicken and stir rice. Replace chicken, sprinkle with cheese and place under broiler until cheese is melted and bubbly. Note: Extra-old Cheddar can be used but because it is white, sprinkle with a bit of paprika for colour. Also, for a change of taste, add a sprinkle of grated Parmesan cheese. – *Glenna Weagle*

Chinese Pork

1 lb pork steak, cubed

2 tbsp flour

2 tbsp oil

3 green peppers, cut in strips

1 cup celery, cut in 1/2 inch pieces

3 tbsp chopped onion

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp pepper

3/4 cup crushed pineapple

1 can consomme

1/4 cup cider vinegar

1 tbsp soya sauce

3/4 cup brown sugar

3 tbsp cornstarch

3 cups cooked rice

Dip pork in flour and brown in oil. Add peppers, onion, celery, salt, pepper, pineapple and half the consomme. Stir vinegar, soya sauce, brown sugar and cornstarch together. Bring pork mixture to boil and add vinegar mixture, stirring until sauce becomes shiny. Simmer covered for 15 minutes. Serve with rice. Note: This dish freezes well. – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Curry is one of the spices we are told we should include in our diet as the health benefits are said to be many. Personally, I add it to foods quite often, simply because I like the flavour. In this recipe you can pair the taste of curry with a choice of different meats so that it becomes a new and different dish.

#### Chicken-Apple Curry

4 cups cooked, cubed chicken

1 large onion, diced

1/2 cup diced raisins

1/2 cup diced celery

1 1/2 cups diced, unpeeled apples

1/4 cup butter

2 tbsp flour

1 tbsp curry powder

1 tbsp brown sugar

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/2 tsp ginger

1 1/2 tbsp chicken bouillon mix.

1 1/2 cup water

1 tbsp lemon juice

Spring onions, diced, for garnish

Heat butter in skillet, add onions and cook until transparent. Add apples and raisins; sauté 5 minutes, add celery and cook 2 more minutes. Combine seasoning and flour and blend in; add chicken bouillon mix dissolved in water with lemon juice, and stir until thickened. Simmer 2 to 3 minutes stirring all the time. Fold in chicken, mix well. Garnish with spring onions. Serve on a bed of rice with apple chutney and fresh cucumber salad. Note: turkey, pork or lamb can be used instead of chicken. – *Glenna Weagle*

- The Co-operative Development Foundation of Canada (CDF) is reaching out to cooperatives and credit unions across Canada for financial support to aid member families affected by Hurricane Agatha, a recent tropical storm that has thrashed the countries of Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras. Co-operative members of at least three of the Canadian Co-operative Association (CCA)'s agricultural partners in the region are among those affected. Cuatro Piños in Guatemala, and the Sociedad Cooperativa Productores de Marañón and Acodasjar in El Salvador report mudslides and damaged homes. El Porvenir Plantain Producer's Co-operative, a co-operative located in northern Honduras, has lost 80 acres of cultivated land. CDF President Wayne McLeod and the CDF Board ask Canadians to support those who have lost so much. "The people of these regions already have challenging lives; it is hard to imagine how this devastation will affect their way of life." Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras have all declared a state of emergency. CCA will be responding immediately by sending funds to rebuild partner co-operatives and members' homes. 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**Today's Smile** - Could crop circles be the work of a cereal killer?



<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - If you are looking for a dessert that is a crowning touch to any meal, you can not go wrong with any recipe made with phyllo pastry. Add to that the fact that apples and almonds seem to be made for each other and these tarts are bound to become a family favourite. If you want to make them a little easier on the waistline you can switch the butter for a soft margarine and/or use a brown sugar substitute which is made for baking or a half-and-half mixture of brown sugar and sucralose.

#### Apple Almond Phyllo Crisps

2 sheets phyllo pastry

2 tsp butter, melted

2 tbsp chopped almonds, toasted

1 1/2 tsp icing sugar

Lay single sheet of phyllo on counter; brush with half of the butter. Using scissors, cut crosswise into three 5-inch wide strips; fold each into thirds to form square shape. Using scissors, round off corners and gently mold into muffin cups. Repeat with remaining phyllo to make 6 shells. Bake in 400F oven for 5 minutes or until golden.

#### Apple Filling:

1/3 cup packed brown sugar

1 tbsp lemon juice

1/2 tsp cinnamon

3 cups sliced peeled apples

In heavy skillet, combine sugar, lemon juice and cinnamon; cook over medium heat until bubbly. Add apples and cook, stirring often, for 5 minutes or until tender; let cool slightly. Spoon

into prepared shells. Sprinkle with almonds; sift icing sugar over top. Serve warm or at room temperature. – *Glenna Weagle*

The Boards of Directors of Central Credit Union (O'Leary) and Evangeline Credit Union (Wellington and Tyne Valley) are exploring the opportunity for an amalgamation of the two Credit Unions, Both Boards believe that the Credit Unions share similar values and have strong commitments to their owners, staff and communities. The Boards also believe that an amalgamation will build on the strengths of both Credit Unions, provide greater access and services for all owners and provide more career opportunities and specialization for staff within a larger organization. Once combined, the Credit Union would have assets of over \$100 Million, three branches (Wellington, Tyne Valley and O'Leary) and some 10,000 owners. This national award program is sponsored by Meetings & Incentive Travel magazine and the InterContinental Hotels Group. It recognizes and awards organizations that invest in meetings as an integral part of doing business. The winner had to have clearly defined goals and objectives for the meetings and be able to measure and calculate a positive return-on-investment for the event. Murielle DiDomenicantonio, the Board Liaison and Meeting Planner at Co-op Atlantic, submitted the award entry and provided a business case describing how Co-op Atlantic manages an event such as the annual Board Tour. From a total of 120 entries submitted

- from across the country, 19 were selected as finalists. The entries were tallied and vetted through an impartial board comprised of industry leaders across Canada. An awards ceremony will take place in August at the Incentive Works Trade-show in Toronto.
- Co-op Atlantic has been awarded the Canadian Co-operative Association's Governance Award for 2010. This award recognizes co-operative organizations that display exceptional leadership in co-operative governance and whose governance process reflects the cooperative values and principles. The award cited Co-op Atlantic for: "going back to basics and turning the business around in very complex and challenging circumstances." In presenting the award to Co-op Atlantic, CCA's president, Claude Gauthier, praised our board's "proactive and transparent communications with its member co-ops." Co-op Atlantic has turned multi-million dollar operating profits for each of the past five years. In the early part of the decade, however, it experienced several years of substantial losses. The board and management made a number of difficult decisions, including closing more than a dozen money-losing locations. After making cuts to ensure profitability in all areas of its business, Co-op Atlantic has now achieved a level of financial stability that would have been unimaginable a decade ago. In expressing his gratitude at the announcement, Co-op Atlantic's president, Marcel Garvie, said the award should be shared with the Executive Management Team because without the full collaboration and co-operation of both parties -Board and Management - this happy event would not have occurred. "This was really a joint achievement of the Board and the senior management. Without that synergy, the turnaround that we are seeing now would not have been possible," said Garvie. The Governance Award competition required that candidates describe their leadership in governance, and the part it played in effecting a turnaround in the organization's financial situation. Readers will recall that the period covering the years 2003 to 2009 was indeed a challenging one. A successful turnaround plan was devised, under the governance of Co-op Atlantic's Board of Directors, and the leadership of its Executive Management Team. Key components of this plan were the constant communication flow and the reception of feedback from the membership throughout the process.

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<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - If you are looking for an elegant dessert to finish a meal, try this semifreddo. Although semifreddo means partially frozen, this can freeze quite firmly. If very firm, place in refrigerator for 15 to 20 minutes before serving to soften slightly.

#### Raspberry Lemon Semifreddo with Melba Sauce

1 can sweetened condensed milk

1/3 cup lemon juice

1 tbsp grated lemon zest

1 cup whipping cream

1 bag frozen raspberries, divided

1/2 cup raspberry jam

1/4 cup orange juice

1/3 cup granulated sugar

2 tsp cornstarch

2 tbsp water

For the semifreddo, in a mixing bowl, combine sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice, lemon zest and whipping cream. Beat on high speed until thickened and soft peaks form. Fold in 1/3 of frozen raspberries. Spoon the mixture into a plastic or glass lined 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Freeze for 4 to 5 hours, or until firm. Cover if freezing overnight.

For the sauce, in a saucepan, combine remaining raspberries, raspberry jam, orange juice and sugar. Bring mixture to a gentle boil, cooking until raspberries are very soft, (about 8 minutes). In a small bowl, combine cornstarch with water and mix thoroughly. Add to raspberry mixture, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens slightly. Remove from heat. Strain through a fine sieve to remove seeds. Cover and refrigerate. To serve, take semifreddo from pan. Cut into slices; place on serving plates and spoon melba sauce over slices. Semifreddo can be made ahead, wrapped well and frozen for up to five days.

Melba Sauce can be covered and refrigerated two days ahead or frozen for two weeks. Note: Spray loaf pan before fitting with plastic wrap. This helps the wrap to stay in place. – *Glenna Weagle*

#### Vegetarian Pasta Sauce

1 medium onion, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped

1 sweet red pepper, chopped

5 garlic cloves, minced

2 tbsp olive oil

3 medium zucchini, chopped

3 medium yellow summer squash, chopped

3 tomatoes, chopped

1 eggplant, peeled and cubed

1/2 lb sliced fresh mushrooms

2 cans (28 oz) Italian crushed tomatoes

1 can (6 oz) tomato paste

2 cans sliced ripe olives, drained

1/4 cup minced fresh basil

3 tbsp minced fresh oregano

1 tbsp minced fresh rosemary

2 tsp Italian seasoning

 $1 \frac{1}{2} \text{ tsp salt}$ 

1/2 tsp pepper

In Dutch oven or large pot, sauté onions, peppers and garlic in oil until tender. Add chopped vegetables and cook, stirring for 5 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients; bring to a boil. - A new national public opinion survey shows that the majority of Canadians view cooperatives as trustworthy, well-run businesses that provide good customer service and create jobs that help support local communities. The survey, conducted by Ipsos Reid on behalf of the Canadian Co-operative Association (CCA), sampled public opinion across Canada on a variety of issues related to co-operatives. Some of the survey's key findings include: \*One in five respondents identified themselves as a member of a co-operative; in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, 61 per cent of respondents cited membership in a co-op, while the figure for Alberta was 44 per cent. \*Seven in 10 respondents agree that co-operatives keep money in the local economy, are an important part of their communities and create jobs that help support local communities. \*More than two-thirds of respondents agree that co-operatives are a trusted place to do business and save members money. \*Two-thirds of respondents agree that co-operatives provide quality products and services. The same percentage of respondents agrees that co-operatives offer good customer service and have a good reputation. \*Three out of five respondents agree that co-operatives offer good value for money and are well-run businesses. \*The words most commonly associated with cooperatives are "local", "for all ages" and "about community". \*Two in five respondents consider themselves to be "very familiar" or "somewhat familiar" with co-operatives, while 18 per cent say they are "not at all familiar" with co-ops. \*49 per cent of respondents thought COSTCO was a co-op; other organizations mistakenly identified as coops by some respondents included Westjet, the Canadian Union of Public Employees, TD Canada Trust and Hudson's Bay Company. The full survey results are available on the CCA website at www.coopscanada.coop/en/about co-operative/Coop survey.
- **Jim MacDonald**, a founder and former president of the Co-operative Housing Federation of Canada, passed away on July 5 at the age of 90. An activist in both the labour and co-

operative movements, he moved to Ottawa from Cape Breton Island in 1959 to become executive secretary of the National Labour Co-operative Committee. He helped create CHF Canada and served as its president from 1972 to 1978. In 1988, on the 20th anniversary of its founding, CHF Canada honoured his work by creating the Jim MacDonald Award for Social Change, which recognizes the achievements of co-ops in social justice and community work. "Co-operative housing exists in Canada in large part because of the work of Jim MacDonald," said Nicholas Gazzard, CHF Canada's executive director. "Jim may no longer be with us but his memory and his legacy will live on." As a young man he apprenticed as an auto mechanic in Sydney. He joined the RCAF when war began and served overseas. After the war, he spent three years at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, NS, and displayed his leadership abilities in co-ops, credit unions and student programs. St. F.X. University in 1982 honoured Jim by granting him the degree of doctor of laws, honouris causa. <u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Although some of my friends now barbecue year round on their decks, many people still consider the barbecue a summertime cooking alternate. This is a great way to cook the more firm types of fish steaks; those which will not fall apart on the grill.

#### Barbecue Salmon Steaks

1/2 cup barbecue sauce (your favourite)

2 tbsp brown sugar

1 green onion, sliced

salmon steaks

Heat greased barbecue to medium-high heat. Mix barbecue sauce, brown sugar and onion until well blended. Grill fish 4 minutes on each side, brushing generously with sauce; (fish should flake easily with fork), Serve with rice and a side salad or vegetable mix of your choosing. Don't barbecue? No problem. Steaks can be broiled 4-inches from heat for 4 minutes per side, brushing both sides generously with sauce. Note: Halibut or swordfish can be substituted for the salmon. – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Those of us who garden know that soon the zucchini will be marching out of the rows in great abundance. We seem to spend a lot of time looking for new uses for this green wonder, or looking for friends who would like to have them. I once heard it said that "this time of year you know the people who have no gardener friends. They are the ones in the supermarkets buying zucchini". Here is a recipe you may not have tried before.

#### Zucchini Bean Salad

1 cup cut fresh green beans

1 can kidney beans, rinsed and drained

1 1/2 cups thinly sliced halved zucchini

1 green pepper, julienned

3 green onions, thinly sliced

3 tbsp cider vinegar

2 tbsp canola oil

1/3tsp sugar

3/4 tsp seasoned salt

1/4 tsp pepper

Place green beans in a small saucepan; cover with water and bring to boil. Cook 8 to 10 minutes (until tender crisp). Drain and rinse with cold water. Combine green beans, kidney beans, zucchini, green pepper and onions. Whisk remaining ingredients together. Pour over bean mixture and toss to coat. Cover and chill. – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - This recipe is fresh, fresh! A leafy green similar to kale, coarsely chopped Swiss chard blends beautifully with diced lean bacon, fresh orange juice and orange zest. This recipe provides the perfect, light complement to the richness of sweet potatoes.

## Swiss Chard with Orange and Bacon

2 lbs Swiss or red chard, tough stems discarded and leaves coarsely chopped

4 slices lean bacon, diced

Zest of 1 orange, finely grated

1 cup freshly squeezed orange juice

2 tbsp unsalted butter

Salt and fresh ground black pepper, to taste

In a large pot of boiling salted water, cook the chard about 3 minutes, until bright green and tender. Drain, squeezing out any excess water from the leaves. In a skillet, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp (about 5 minutes). Transfer bacon to a plate. Pour the orange juice into

the same skillet. Bring to a boil. Cook, stirring occasionally, until mixture is reduced and slightly thickened, about 4 minutes. Turn off heat. Stir in butter or margarine, orange zest and chard. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Transfer to a serving dish, top with diced bacon and serve. – *Glenna Weagle*

New Leaf has been a part of the Tallahassee community for nearly four decades and boasts a membership of over 10,000, and continues to see strong growth. In 1974 the buying club legally became the Leon County Food Cooperative (LCFC). On

May 1, 1974 the Co-op found its first permanent home with only 200 owners, \$1000 in capital and \$260 in inventory. Just a year and a half later in 1976 the LCFC moved to a warehouse, which offered approximately 4,500 sq. ft. of retail space in addition to housing the Canopy Road Credit Union. The LCFC was staffed by volunteers and led by a three-person management team and a small Board of Directors The newly expanded and renovated store (2008) includes two additional checkout lanes, and additional retail space for grocery, frozen, refrigerated, and health and body care. The beer and wine department now includes 16 feet of chilled beer and over 300 types of wine. They also expanded their deli. ## Frosted Pineapple Lemon Gelatin

1 can crushed pineapple, drained, reserving juice

2 pkgs lemon gelatin

2 cups boiling water2 cups ginger ale, chilled

2 large, firm bananas, sliced

1/2 cup sugar

2 tbsp flour

1 egg, lightly beaten

2 tbsp butter

1 cup heavy whipping cream

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in ginger ale, bananas and pineapple. Transfer to 9 x 13-inch pan. Refrigerate until firm. Combine sugar and flour in small saucepan. Gradually whisk in reserved pineapple juice. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir for 2 minutes (until thickened). Remove from heat. Stir a small amount of hot mixture into egg; return to heat and add egg into custard, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until thickened. Remove from heat, stir in butter and cool to room temperature.

In small bowl, beat cream until stiff peaks form. Gently fold cream into custard. Spread over gelatin. Refrigerate 1 hour (until chilled). – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Here is a quick summertime salad which goes perfectly with a barbecued steak and baked potato.

#### Grilled Oriental Mushroom Salad

- 3 tbsp vegetable oil
- 2 tbsp soy sauce
- 1/3 cup rice vinegar
- 1 tbsp Dijon mustard
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 1 tbsp finely minced gingerroot
- 1 lb assorted sliced fresh mushrooms (white button, crimini, portabella, shitaki, oyster)
- 3 tbsp teriyaki sauce (plain or roasted garlic)
- 6 cups mixed salad greens or baby spinach
- 1 tbsp sesame seeds

In small saucepan, mix oil, soy sauce, vinegar, garlic, mustard, onions and gingerroot; set aside. Pile mushrooms in centre of large piece of heavy-duty aluminum foil. Drizzle with teriyaki

sauce. Fold edges and ends to seal well. Barbecue on high heat for 5 to 6 minutes or until steaming. (Note: Mushrooms may be cooked in a 425F oven instead of on barbecue.) Heat dressing on barbecue, stovetop, or in microwave oven just until boiling. Divide salad greens evenly among 4 large salad plates. Top with warm mushroom slices and drizzle with hot dressing. Sprinkle sesame seeds on top. Serve immediately. – *Glenna Weagle*

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Thanksgiving is not far away. This is a time when I begin to look for the recipes I might like to use for this holiday. As my family has shrunk drastically over the past few years, I'm beginning to think the following recipe would be a great exchange for the usual Roast Turkey which seems to make endless appearances as different menu items before it finally disappears.

Roast Sage Turkey Tenderloin with Orange Ginger Cranberry Sauce

8 to 10 fresh sage leaves 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil 1 tbsp unsalted butter

1 clove garlic

juice of 1/2 lemon

zest of 1/2 lemon
salt, to taste
black pepper, freshly ground to taste
1 turkey tenderloin
7 ounces dried cranberries
3 sticks cinnamon
1 cup ginger ale or ginger beer
3 seedless oranges, peeled and chopped
zest from 1 orange
1 apple, cored and chopped
walnuts, crushed and toasted, for garnish

fresh parsley, chopped, for garnish Combine sage leaves, olive oil, butter, garlic. lemon juice and zest in a blender or food processor and blend until smooth; set aside. Place the tenderloin in a medium-sized, oven-safe sauté pan. Liberally season on both sides with salt and pepper. Spread the sage mixture over the tenderloin and allow to rest at room temperature for 15 to 20 minutes. Place pan in the oven and bake at 375F until the internal temperature of the thickest part reaches 160°F, (approximately 25

minutes). Remove from the oven and transfer tenderloin to a cutting board. Cover with foil and allow to rest for 5 to 10 minutes before slicing. Top with cranberry spread, fresh walnuts and chopped parsley.

Cranberry Spread: Combine cranberries, cinnamon, ginger ale (or ginger beer), oranges, orange zest and apple in a medium saucepan over low-medium heat. Simmer until the liquid is reduced by three-fourths, (approximately 20 minutes). Remove cinnamon sticks. Transfer the contents of the pan to a food processor or blender and pulse until the desired texture is achieved. Stir in lemon juice to taste and garnish with crushed, toasted walnuts.

The museum received £1.5 million from the UK's Heritage Lottery Fund to modernize the complex. The museum will be transformed and updated, creating new visitor facilities and learning spaces. New displays will be designed incorporating images and objects from the National Co-operative Archive. Specialist staff will be recruited to teach schools, colleges and the local community about the co-operative movement using the archive and museum materials. Collections from the archive will also be available for public viewing for the first time, including some papers and books of co-operative pioneer Robert Owen as well as material charting the history of the modern-day Co-operative Group and Cooperatives UK. The museum closed its doors at the end of August for the 16-month facelift and is scheduled to reopen on December 21, 2011, 167 years after the opening of 31 Toad Lane as the Rochdale Pioneers' first co-operative store.

• The Co-operative Development Initiative (CDI) is a Government of Canada program delivered in partnership with the co-operative sector. CDI is designed to help people develop co-ops and to research and test innovative ways of using the co-operative model. CDI will make the co-op option more readily available to Canadians, to respond to their present-day challenges. The program has three interrelated components: The Advisory Services component is delivered by the co-operative sector through a network of co-operative development experts established across the country. The objective is to provide access to professional and technical services needed for the successful launch or strengthening of a co-operative. The Innovative Co-operative Projects component provides funding to innovative projects that respond to public policy priority areas and generate best practices and learning. The next deadline for applications for Innovative Co-operative Projects is October 31, 2010. The policy priorities to be addressed through the Innovative Co-operative Projects are: agriculture, including farmer-driven value-added agriculture and biofuels; rural/northern community development; innovative goods and services, including innovative technologies; and capacity building and sustainability. The upper limit of funding for Innovative Co-operative Projects is \$75,000 per year per project. The minimum proponent contribution for Innovative Co-operative Projects is 25% per individual project. **Co-op Ed 101** – Working with community groups to raise money.

Products are made at its plants in Bedford, NS, Truro, NS and St. John's, NL. Check out the Farmers Cheese Fundraising program. 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<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - If you know a farmer who raises turkeys, it is possible to get a fresh, flavourful turkey to grace you table for Thanksgiving. If you buy your turkey at the market like most of us do, you may like to try brining the bird. Brining is a chef's trick for improving flavour and texture, and this dry method is easier than the wet method. It's essential to use kosher salt and to rinse all traces of the sugar-salt mixture from the turkey before roasting.

#### Dry-Brined Roast Turkey with Gravy

3 cups packed brown sugar
3/4 cup kosher salt
5 to 7.5 kg turkey, thawed if frozen
1 bunch fresh sage
3 tbsp melted butter
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup white wine
2 cups water
salt and pepper

Stir brown sugar and salt together. Rinse turkey and dry very well with paper towels. Place turkey in a large pan or plastic bag, Pack brown sugar mixture all over the turkey, placing some in cavity as well. Cover pan or tie bag, and refrigerate 12 hours or overnight. When brining time is finished, rinse brine from the turkey, (inside and out), gently rubbing under cold running water so it all comes off. (Don't worry if the legs and wings look purple, this is the result of brining.) Pat turkey dry; stuff sage into cavity and place on a rack in the roasting pan. Bend and tuck wings under the body and loosely tie drumsticks together. Brush butter all over turkey. Loosely cover with foil. Roast for 30 minutes at 450F Reduce oven temperature to 325F. Roast until an instant-read thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the thigh reads 175F, (about 2 1/2 to 3 1/4 hours). Remove foil during the final hour of cooking. Transfer turkey to a platter, tent loosely with foil and let rest at least 25 min before carving. Carefully spoon most of the fat out of the roasting pan, leaving about 4 tbsp fat as well as all the brown bits. Place the pan over medium heat and stir in flour, whisking to completely incorporate flour into drippings. Cook for 30 sec, then whisk in wine and water. Increase heat to medium-high, whisking constantly, until thickened, (about 10 to 15 min), scraping up and incorporating all the brown bits from the pan. Reduce heat to low. If needed, whisk in additional water or homemade turkey stock to reach the desired consistency for gravy. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Happy Thanksgiving folks! – Glenna Weagle

- The Nova Scotia Co-op Council (NSCC) and its French counterpart, Le Conseil Coopératif Acadien de la Nouvelle-Écosse (CCANE), have signed a memorandum of understanding to reinforce the importance of working together more closely for the benefit of all cooperatives and credit unions in the province. There are 402 co-operative businesses in Nova Scotia worth over \$5 billion dollars in assets, so as development agencies, the NSCC and the CCANE have a role and a responsibility to support these co-operatives and help others who wish to adopt the co-operative model. The agreement has four goals: 1. To work together to promote the economic development of communities in all regions of Nova Scotia; 2. To better coordinate the cooperative efforts of both parties throughout Nova Scotia; 3. To increase the capacity of service delivery in francophone communities; and 4. To work together on two projects in 2010, namely reaching out to young people and director training. The two groups intend to first focus on working with youth as well as director training, and intend to reach a more permanent partnership within the next two years.

<u>Co-op Cooking</u> - Pumpkin always seems to go with this season. Perhaps you have not yet tried it in a cheesecake. The sour cream topping is the perfect complement to the pumpkin flavour.

### Pumpkin Cheesecake with Sour Cream Topping

1 1/2 cup graham wafer crumbs

1/4 cup sugar

1/3 cup butter, melted

3 pkg cream cheese, softened

1 cup packed brown sugar

1 can (15 oz) solid-pack pumpkin

2 tbsp cornstarch

1 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp ground nutmeg

1 can evaporated milk 2 eggs 2 cups sour cream 1/3 cup sugar 1 tsp vanilla extract ground cinnamon

Combine crumbs and sugar; stir in butter. Press onto bottom and 1 1/2 –inch up sides of spring form pan. Bake at 350F for 5 to 7 minutes. Beat cream cheese and brown sugar until smooth. Add pumpkin, cornstarch, cinnamon and nutmeg; mix well. Gradually beat in milk and eggs just until blended. Pour into crust. Place on baking sheet. Bake at 350F for 55 to 60 minutes (until center is almost set). Combine sour cream, sugar and vanilla; spread over filling. Bake 5 minutes longer. Cool on ware rack for 10 minutes. Carefully loosen edge from pan; cool 1 hour longer. Chill overnight. Remove sides of pan; let stand at room temperature 30 minutes before slicing. Sprinkle individual servings with additional cinnamon. Refrigerate leftovers. Bon appetite! – *Glenna Weagle*
